# Fairfields-Sylvan Infrastructure Update!

- 62<sup>nd</sup> Street Multi-Use Path: Based on information received in July from the Indianapolis Department of Public Works, the path construction should begin in late summer and be complete by July, 2012 (see DPW project sheet). Additional information is being requested at this time and will be shared at upcoming F-SNA meetings.
- Allisonville Road Bridge over I-465: Scheduled to be CLOSED no more than five months beginning no later than March 1, 2012. The holiday shopping season will not be impacted, according to Indiana Department of Transportation representatives (see attached notice + <a href="http://www.465-69northeast.in.gov/AllisonI465.html">http://www.465-69northeast.in.gov/AllisonI465.html</a>)
- Keystone Avenue interchange with I-465: Traffic patterns have changed resulting in increased congestion at this interchange. The interchange construction is expected to be complete in November, 2011. (http://www.465-69northeast.in.gov/KeystoneAve465.html)

## Private Funds May Kickstart Rail Plan....read more

"An innovative private financing deal struck last year to expand Denver's rail transit system could be used to expedite construction of the first line in central Indiana.

Local transit proponents have been approached by private investor groups about the potential for similar financing schemes here, starting with a Downtown-to-Hamilton County route.

Ehren Bingaman, executive director of the Central Indiana Regional Transportation Authority, said he wouldn't rule out the concept of a private partnership. 'I think the short of it is, we'd be open to it,' said Bingaman, whose group lately has been engaged in an environmental impact study required for the planned northeast-side route, which would use the former Nickel Plate Railroad right-of-way. . . .

But are the taxpayers in Marion and surrounding counties willing to pay for the system? One idea floated has been a regional sales tax. Indy Connect previously estimated that a \$2.5 billion system could cost each taxpayer the equivalent of \$15 a month per household.

There's also the matter of well-to-do Hamilton County receiving the most perceived benefit. The first leg - the northeast line - would be a boon for commuters from that area who work downtown. . . .

'Ultimately', said Bingaman, 'you still have to demonstrate you have local commitment to fund some part of this. . . . Denver made it work because the private equity partner understood there is a long-term commitment of the municipality."

On Friday evening, August 12<sup>th</sup>, Sandy and I attended a Block Party on resurfaced East 64th Street east of Allisonville. This is an attractive, wooded, middle class area of deep property lots. We met nice people with many children playing on the newly-paved asphalt street - bicycles, skateboards, roller skates, mothers pushing babies in strollers.

While we were there conversing with them, "Fair Trains" rumbled through with excessive vibrations several times, and blowing their loud whistles. These neighbors are very concerned that mass transit trains passing by their back yards every 30 to 60 minutes daily will severely degrade the quality of their lives and values of their homes.

Such frequent trains will also affect Fairfields-Sylvan, in view of our similar Nickel Plate RR situation at East 61st Street and North Chester Avenue, as well as the homes along Kessler Ridge Road. At this time, it is unclear as to the size of mass transit trains being considered."

### **New F-SNA/ John Strange School PTO Committee**

F-SNA Board members Tom Sturmer and Ted Hudnut joined leaders from the John Strange PTO to form a Committee to work on areas of mutual interest. The focus last Spring centered on preparing a Safe Routes to School (SRTS) grant funding application, which was not endorsed by the grant deadline by the School District. The Committee will reconvene in September to decide on an appropriate course of action and future initiatives.

One of the issues that the SRTS project intended to address was daily traffic congestion at the school during drop off and pick up times, and event parking. The School and District administrations are aware of the neighbor's concerns, and have assigned security guards to the most recent event to address on-street parking. The intention is to have parking occur only on one-side of Olney Street, according to a security guard interviewed at the School's Parent Information Night held on August 25. A letter informing the neighbors of upcoming School events and inviting volunteers to help students was distributed at the beginning of the school year.
