Crime Watch Update – Summer Vacation

Our Eastwood neighbors are also invited, allowing both of our Associations to comment and ask questions regarding local mass transit issues.

Further, there will be a complete Indy Connect regional transportation plan presentation on **Wednesday**, **04/28**, 7:00 pm at Eastwood Middle School.

Regional Transit Announcement: Upcoming Indy Connect Meeting will Focus on NE Corridor Rail Plans

Indy Connect recently released a draft plan for Central Indiana transportation, thereby launching an intense <u>schedule of public meetings on transit</u> throughout the region to gather comments and answer questions from people throughout the area. Public feedback and suggestions will be incorporated into a revised plan in late 2010 that will be presented to the public for further consideration.

The <u>draft regional transportation plan</u> includes recommendations for enhanced bus, commuter and light rail, expanded roadways, pedestrian walkways and bike paths, and it outlines how these modes of transportation could work together to connect people and places in Central Indiana. Among the features of this preliminary plan is expanded bus service that could decrease wait time between buses, increase cross-city service, require fewer

transfers and provide more and quicker service both within and beyond Marion County. This bus service would connect with other modes of transportation, including rail and pedestrian walkways and bikeways.

Due to population growth and traffic patterns in the area, the <u>Northeast Corridor</u> from Indianapolis to Noblesville was identified by the Indianapolis Regional Transportation Council more than 10 years ago as the first leg of a potential regional transportation system. The corridor is likely to qualify for federal funding, and the potential for transit-related development along the corridor is high. The Indy Connect draft plan includes a commuter train that could run along this corridor.

Currently, transportation planners are studying various alternatives for the corridor, as well as identifying all environmental, social, and economic impacts and benefits of a potential commuter rail line. As part of the Indy Connect initiative, the public is encouraged to attend one of the upcoming meetings, where they will hear a brief presentation on the background of the project, the conceptual alternatives under consideration, and the environmental process, and will be invited to meet one-on-one with members of the project team to gain additional information and engage in detailed discussions.

Multi-Modal Pathway Update

Special thanks to Connie and John Smith for their efforts to collect, coordinate and report on this project!

At the F-SNA meeting held March 17th, the board requested that the neighborhood Sidewalk/Pathways survey results be sent to District 4 City Counselor, Christine Scales. A letter of introduction was sent with the original surveys. Copies of the letter and surveys were sent to Mayor Greg Ballard. The letter listed talking points expressed by neighbors for and against construction of a multi-modal pathway along E. 62nd Street.

Respondents favoring pathway stated:

- Bicyclists and walkers that currently use E. 62nd Street face a significant safety issue. A pathway would eliminate people from walking on the road, as they do presently
- A multi-modal pathway will increase property values in the F-SNA neighborhood
- A multi-modal path will give residents an alternative to walk or ride bikes instead of using cars for short trips, thus the pathway will reduce traffic congestion and pollution
 - The pathway will promote health benefits by encouraging walking, running and biking
- · Economic development will promote more patronage of local merchants
- The pathway will improve aesthetics and quality of life in the neighborhood
- The pathway is a legacy for future generations

Respondents against pathway stated:

- The city should install "No Littering" signs before the city spends money on a pathway
- The pathway would create a safety problem by impairing passage in and out of driveways
- Mixing pedestrian /bicycle traffic with vehicular traffic along a major thoroughfare without a barrier is an unsafe pratice
- Sewers, instead of the pathway, should be a priorty

Additional surveys have been collected which will also be mailed to Ms. Scales and the Mayor. As of March 30, 2010, a total of eighty-two household surveys have been collected. Seventy-five of the surveys are in favor the Multi-Modal Pathway and seven are against. The surveys received were counted as households not counted as individual persons.

A letter of support was received by Mr. Eric Strickland, Project Manager for Kite Realty. Mr. Strickland was the project manager for the Glendale Towne Center. In his letter, Mr. Strickland stated that "the pathway would provide a safe pedestrian connectivity to the Glendale Towne Center which doesn't exist now for the surrounding residents who may want to walk or bike to the center." Mr. Strickland worked with Bob Lehnen of Greater Allisonville Community Council during the development of Glendale. When Kite Realty was formed of the trail project idea, they accounted for bicycle traffic from the proposed trail by constructing a bicycle parking area to the north side of the center near the IU Medical Group which is ready for use today. Mr. Strickland sent his letter to Councilor Scales on March 26, 2010.

In 2002 the Glendale Mall area was selected by the Metropolitan Planning Organization for a Special Neighborhood Study. The study concluded that "The square mile centered on Glendale Mall was selected for this demonstration study because of its sizable population (approximately 6,000 people), its busy thorough fares, multiple bus routes, proximity to two greenway corridors, its many theoretically walkable destinations and its deficiencies in existing walking, bicycling and transit facilities." After this study, the F-SNA wrote a letter supporting collector sidewalks along 62nd Street.

We appreciate everyone that took the time to fill out the survey. As neighbors, we must all take pride in our neighborhood as a wonderful place that can be enjoyed by all.
